A Message from the Spiritual Directors

A year ago we wrote to you about the reality of Pentecost in our Cursillo experience – in so many ways parallel experience for us and for the apostles. The similarities provide background for our lives as Cursillistas, remembering always the essential connection between the life of the Church and our activities as a movement within the Church.

The Church is, of course the community which surpasses all others since it is in reality the living body of Christ, the complete Christ where human and divine activity blend. It is the reality in which every human life has the capacity of manifesting the life of Jesus, Son of God and Son of Mary.

Whatever we do and whatever we are as Cursillistas must be the living out of the life of the God Man, making present at this point in time and space the merciful and grace-filled life of Mary's Son. Our devotion to Cursillo can be all-embracing,

Going back to our Roots: I often heard it said after Vatican Council two, that things were “new.” The Mass was new, our prayers were new, and our outlook was new. Nothing could have been farther from the truth. In fact the church was going back to the beginning – to the original church, before all the additions of the middle and later ages were added. I once heard a priest say, the ship of the church has gone into dry dock to have the barnacles of the centuries removed.

And so it is with our movement. Over the last couple of years, we have been going back to our roots. We are trying to find the authentic expression of Cursillo. We want a Cursillo, more in line with the vision of the founders, less dependent on the additions of the years or traditions of a particular place. As many of you read the news coming out of Secretariat and Leaders School, you may

taking great portions of time and effort, but only because of the ultimate reality of the life of Jesus Christ lived out in that effort of time and space.

Following the celebration of the Feast of Pentecost we immediately revert to Ordinary Time, where, in fact, the activity of the Holy Spirit continues intensely. Our daily lives must reflect that divine presence and activity. A world where values are betrayed and ideals become insignificant must learn once again how precious it is as a divine creation.

May our lives as Cursillistas always reflect the full dimension of God's infinite mercy. May we live Pentecost every moment. Read the Leaders Prayer and find that Pentecostal dimension. Live that reality and the prayer that reflects it. ULTREYA!!!

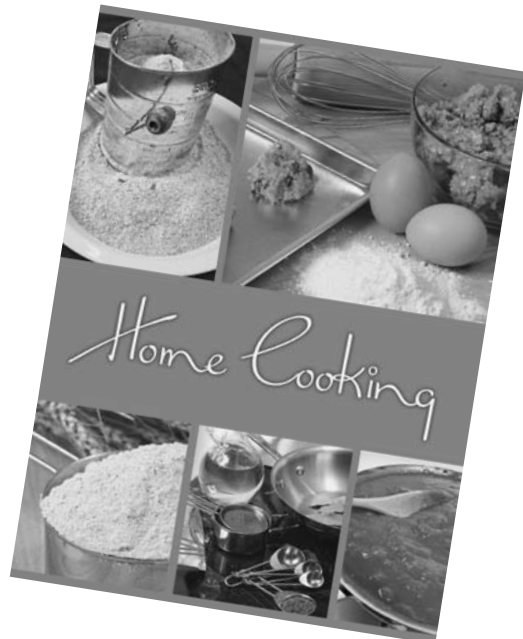

Chick Pea (Garbanzo) Salad

1 15.5 oz. can chick peas, drained and rinsed
1/2 cup red pepper, chopped
1 small red or sweet onion, chopped
1 medium cucumber, chopped

3 TB. olive (canola) oil
1/4 tsp. each garlic powder and oregano (or basil)

What Cursillo Leaders Can Learn From Olympic Skiers and Other Athletes

We are moving under the influence of forces which are beyond the strength or full understanding by the casual observer: gravity and friction. Gravity causes acceleration, while friction causes deceleration.

Gravity pulls the skier down the slope towards the finish line. Its pull is the same for every skier. Friction varies. It is manifested in the roughness of the surface, wind and the presence of obstacles. Skiers need to know how to work with these forces and use them to their advantage. This is accomplished through training under the guidance of coaches, who have been involved for a long time, and experience. One learns to steer, slow, speed up, jump and how to identify obstacles. All this isn't accomplished over night, and requires perseverance and dedication, when things get difficult.

Skiers work hard, study the courses they intend to challenge, and use self-denial to condition themselves in preparation for the great effort they know they will be faced with.

All this reminds me of the Rollos: Grace and Obstacles to Grace. It also reminds me of Christian Community and The Fourth Day. Our finish line is the kingdom of God, bringing our brothers and sisters with us. For our coaches we have reunions, ultreyas, spiritual directors and our School of Leaders. Grace moves us toward God and heaven, sin impedes our progress. Jesus and His Holy Spirit lead us mainly through leaders, as well as using us to assist others.

We are invited to employ prayer, study and action. We need to exercise our souls through self denial in preparing for the great work we are accepting for the love of God and building up of His kingdom.

Our Lord Ascends


Today is the day that the Church recognizes Christ's Ascension to the right hand of the Father but as a very wise St. Augustine said in today's Office of the Readings (Liturgy of the Hours), He never really left us. He was here in the beginning, touched us in a very tangible way while becoming one of us and then sent the Holy Spirit down upon His Church to protect and serve the faithful. He has never left us.

Cursillo is one of the graces of the Holy Spirit that has been given to the Church as yet another way to access Christ in a deeper way. "Depth in the movement" is what we say during our Leaders prayer and "not surface glory." The depth needed to recognize the power of Christ around us all the time and revel in the food we can truly live on instead of the "sweetness" of flashy programs or fancy treats.

Cursillo in de Christianidad is a process, not a weekend. It is a process by which we open ourselves to Christ asking the Holy Spirit to touch down upon our hearts and ENFLAME them! Make them burn so brightly that others are encouraged to have that flame light or re-light their own hearts. We are to show people the strength by which we are able to live with joy despite the pain as my own mother attests to; by being in Christ and the Holy Spirit being in her heart for the Glory of God the Father.

Book Review

It is no exaggeration to call this book a spiritual gold mine. Written by an extremely gifted French priest, beautifully translated and based upon the timeless, universal wisdom of St. Therese of Lisieux, this book will serve you well for years to come and no matter how often you read it.

As the title indicates, the author intends for the book to serve as a basis for a personal retreat. The reader can use the book very profitably for an hour, half a day, a weekend or for several days. You could focus on a single chapter for any length of time you desire. And the contents will never grow old or stale.

While the book contains many gems from St. Therese, the author complements her writings with insights from St. Teresa of Avila, St. John of the Cross and St. Francis de Sales, among other saints. Scripture is beautifully woven into the themes of the book, as are reflections of numerous popes and other distinguished spiritual guides.

Because the book is intended for personal retreats, the chapter headings are called “conferences.” So, for example, the book contains conferences on “Humble Confidence,” “Abandonment to Jesus,” “Great Desires, Humility and Peace,” and “The Eucharist.”

What is special about St. Therese? Her spirituality is for everybody. In her own words, she wanted to find a short, little way to heaven. As she writes, “I would like to find an elevator to lift me up to Jesus, for I am too little to climb the rough stairway of perfection.” She found the elevator in Proverbs 9:16: “He that is a little one, let him turn to me.” She decided to be little. She concluded, “The elevator which must raise me to the heavens is your arms, O Jesus! For that I do not need to grow; on the contrary, I must necessarily remain small, become smaller and smaller. O my God, You have surpassed what I expected, and I want to sing your mercies.”

For Therese, then, as for all of us, surrendering to Jesus and acknowledging her

weakness made room for the grace of Jesus to grow within her. What she could not do, Jesus did for her. As she focused on her littleness, she found great peace. She wrote, “I always remain in a profound peace, which nothing can trouble. If the Lord offered me the choice, I would not choose anything. I want nothing but what He wants. It is what He does that I love.”

Powerful words like these are difficult for us, with our modern way of thinking, to understand. By choosing to be small, by being completely open to God’s grace to the point of committing to love others even though we are rejected, God’s grace becomes very powerful in us. This is why, though she lived in obscurity and died at the age of 24, St. Therese, through her writings, has transformed the lives of millions and has been declared a doctor of the Church. She is proof of God’s words to St. Paul in 2 Corinthians 12: “My power is made perfect in weakness.”

Every one of us can choose, as Therese did, to become small so that Jesus can be magnified in us, to become totally confident not in ourselves, but in the grace of Jesus Christ. This book is the perfect resource to guide us on the way.

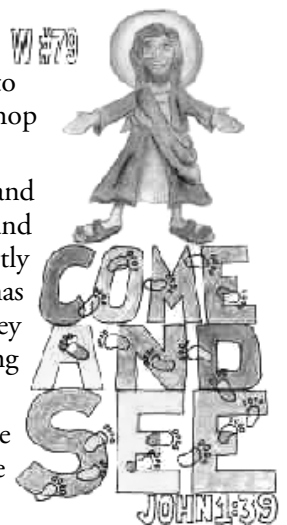
